Qualitative analysis of Criterion 1

The institute is located at Singapur, Huzurabad in a lush green, eco friendly campus with sound infrastructure. The institute is conducting with 5 UG and 1 PG programme. The Institute is affiliated with JNTUH, Hyderabad and follows the curriculum prescribed by the University. All the departments prepare academic calendar based on Jawaharlal Nehru Technological University Hyderabad (JNTUH) inputs. Since the institute is affiliated to JNTUH, it follows the syllabus prescribed by the University. However the implementation of curriculum is effectively followed as per academic calendar prepared by the department. Continuous evaluation is carried out by conducting mid term tests, Surprise tests, quizzes, assignments end semester exams for UG and PG. The gender equity is well maintained in the institute and the institute has women protection cell to take up grievances of girl students. The institute follows the reservation policy for girl students as per the state government of Telangana norms. The institute has environmental science and technology courses to understand the development technologies by ecological principles and environmental regulations. The institute has human values and professional ethics course to sensitize the students with the cross cutting issues relevant to gender, environment and sustainability to understand the human values. The institute collects feedback from students and follow up is seen to a limited extent. The students have developed web portal through which the attendance and internal marks of the students are sent to parents.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

The institute follows the admission procedure as per the rules laid down by the state government. The institute follows the reservation policy as per the state government of Telangana. The institute conducts two weeks induction programme for the first year students. Slow learners and advanced learners are identified by the institute and remedial classes, assignments and clearing doubts sessions for the slow learners are conducted. Institute provides support for the advance learners by conducting GATE coaching and inputs for other competitive exams. Institute has 114 faculty members in the institute, out of which 22 faculty members possess Ph.D and remaining are postgraduates. 22 faculty members are pursuing Ph.D. 19.3% of faculty members possess Ph. D. qualification. More laboratories for PG course need to be established to attract the students. Faculty members with PG qualifications need to be motivated to pursue Ph.D programme. The student performance is evaluated by conducting two mid semester exams and one end semester exam. A well laid mechanism duly approved by the University is in place to evaluate and assess the performance of the students. The evaluation process framed by the University is followed by the institute and the students have the opportunities for grievance redressal for the end semester examination. Institute also tries to attract GATE qualified students for PG course. On-line courses such as NPTEL, MOOCS are made available for faculty and students. Students need to be encouraged to use library facilities extensively. Faculties are participating in seminars/workshops/FEPs. Faculty should be encouraged to conduct research in reputed institutions of higher learning. The pass percentage of final year students in the semester examination is around 70 %. All departments have defined POs, PEOs and COs are in place. However the process of attainment needs to be in place/ strengthened.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 3

Institute needs to immediately create a eco system for research, innovation and other initiatives. Out of 22 Ph. D qualified faculty, 07 are recognized supervisors for guiding research scholars. Institution has not attracted externally funded research projects. The faculty members should be motivated to do consultancy and try to get funding from various agencies to strengthen the research ambience. Faculty needs to be motivated and incentives should be enhanced to take up research. More collaborative programmes with reputed institution/R&D organization and industry to be taken up. Adequate Infrastructure facility in terms of equipments are to be added in all the departments. Inter disciplinary research to be focused for both faculty and students. Faculty members have presented papers in National and International Conferences as well as published a book. There are publications done by faculty in UGC approved journals and few of them are in Scopus indexed journals. Institute is socially responsive through its NSS activities and encouraging social responsibilities among the boys and girls through various community development programmes, Blood donation and tree plantation etc.The NCC wing of institute is performing well. Institute has signed two MOUs for Training and Internship for students. The institute has NSS unit to carry out extension activities like plantation and Swachh Bharat.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 4

The Institute has adequate laboratories, Language Lab and Class Rooms. Digital Library is available and Book Bank facilities are available in the Institute for the students. Library has 47319 volumes and 8200 titles , 457 e-journals and subscribed DELNET, NDL, NPTEL video lectures for the students. Institute provides e-journals like Springer and Elsevier to initiate research. 24 International Journals and 55 National Journals are subscribed, however numbers of rare books are limited. The institute has 54 Mbps leased line Internet with Wi-Fi connectivity. The utilization of Library resources by the students and faculty is to be enhanced. The Institute has procured adequate softwares. Budget is duly allotted for the enhancement of Library. The students are encouraged for participating in various sports events. Some students have participated in Inter and Intra sports competitions. Students are also encouraged for extra and co-curricular activities. In-door and Out-door sports facilities are adequate. Alumni association is registered. Hostels are available for boys and girls with the sports facilities, mess and all other required amenities including safety features. However the facilities needs to be improved in terms cleanliness, hygiene and provide due academic ambience and independence to pursue studies.

In addition to this institution also gives scholarship to meritorious students where in more than thousand students are benefited every year. Grievance Redressal Committee exists to address student grievances. Training and placement officer conducts various training programs for the students. The institute is conducting workshops, seminars and guest lectures for the students. Overall pass percentage needs to be improved while the 1st year passing percentage should be improved. Student chapters like IETE, ISTE and CSI are functional. Alumni cell is formed and registered. Institute is taking efforts for the student's placement and most of the students are placed in on and off campus processes including pooled campus selection process

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 6

The institute has visionary management. However they need to articulate a comprehensive strategic plan. There are limited financial powers for the Administrative Heads. Welfare measures like Group Insurance, PF for staff, students along with partial reimbursement of children education fee for the staff members is also provided. Faculty members are deputed to attend FEP, SDP, Seminar and Workshops conducted by the reputed institutions but the financial support provided is less. Well laid out strategic plan for establishing centers of excellence for research, innovation and entrepreneurship is needed. Strategic plan needs to include measures to attract the key industries for providing internship, training and collaborative research. The Institute has IQAC cell. However activities of IQAC need to be strengthened to ensure that it carries out comprehensive review of quality initiatives.

The Institute maintains gender sensitivity. The Institute has Grievance Committee to address all related matters. Various Programmes have been conducted on crisis in safety, security and dignity of women, women self defence etc. Mentors for a group of 20 students each have been appointed who take care of the counselling. However institute should appoint a full time counsellor.. The Institute has RO, rain water harvesting and water sewage disposal facilities. The institute has installed solar panels to meet around 60% of campus needs. The campus is plastic free. Swachh Bharat initiatives are in place. The Institute has

Gymnasium and Canteen facilities for the students. However facilities need to be improved in terms of cleanliness and hygiene. NSS team is actively conducting various activities like tree plantations, blood donation camps and adopting villages, Ramp and other facilities for Divyang are available. The institute pursues host of extension activities for the surrounding areas.

Training and internship, Sponsored/ research, patents and consultancy and lack of entrepreneurship initiatives. More efforts needed for Industry Institution interaction..

To foster collaboration with government and R&D organizations and institutions of higher learning. Value added courses in emerging areas. Effective utilization of alumni for college development. Entrepreneurship opportunities for students.

Fostering effective and meaningful linkage with industry for skill enhancement. Encouraging faculty and students to strive for academic excellence. Right ambiance for institutional consultancy and sponsored research projects. Attracting qualified and competent faculty with Ph. D degree from reputed institution. Motivating faculty for research and quality publications in reputed journals.
